SAFETY: The playground is fenced and it is easy to keep an eye on your children. The play areas are laid out well so children know what areas to play in. The street is safe for parking and walking in.

## Natural Barriers

Point out the natural barriers to help children understand how to play safely.

**Swings:** "Look! These poles are here so we don't run in front of the swings. They could knock us over. And here is the entry way to go in. We can stand and wait here for a turn."

**Bike track:** It is tricky learning the "rules of the road" when you are just learning to ride a bike. Take along some chalk and draw arrows for what direction to ride and a "Stop" sign for intersections.

Put a couple of little toys in your pocket and see how it helps you to stay longer.
